Chairman Meeks:

Illinois public schools are facing a crisis due to a lack of teachers.

A 2015-16 school year survey conducted by the Illinois Association of Regional Superintendents of School found that 75 percent of districts had fewer qualified candidates than in previous years and 16 percent of schools canceled programs or classes because of teacher shortages. Additionally, the State Board has indicated that there are currently more than 2,000 unfilled positions in the state.

Furthermore, this is not an isolated crisis that impacts a specific region of the state. At a Senate Education Committee hearing held in Decatur on November 6, we heard testimony from teachers and administrators that highlighted this issue as a major concern for districts all across the state, including urban, suburban, and rural districts.

We commend you for the effort made thus far by the State Board to address teacher shortages and for further prioritizing the issue by initiating a year of inquiry on the subject. However, this is a crisis that deserves even more urgent attention and swift action to provide crucial support to students, administrators, and teachers.

We respectfully urge the State Board to accelerate its inquiry into this matter and report findings and recommendations by March 1, 2018. This will ensure there is time for the General Assembly to craft legislation to address the teacher shortage crisis prior to the next school year.
